Impact

In August, the Impact Team started a five-part Caregiver Storytelling Series that runs until September 13. These events, at various locations around St. Louis, support caregivers by giving them a trusted space to share their lived experiences through audio, video, written, drawn, or other creative forms. We're partnered with WETA and their Well Beings campaign—a national initiative to elevate and honor the experiences of caregivers through storytelling.

Nine PBS provides materials, facilitation, and support for this series. Volunteers help us host and connect with caregivers who want their stories to be seen and celebrated. The first two sessions were highly successful!
