

Yampa Valley Survey Key Findings May 2025

Methodology

New Bridge Strategy conducted a survey among N=300 registered voters throughout the Yampa Valley that would constitute a potential RTA from April 29-May 5, 2025. Interviews were conducted via live telephone interviews (both cell phones and landlines) and online. Interviews were distributed proportionally throughout the district. Quotas were set for key demographic subgroups, such as gender and age.


The margin of error is $\pm 5.66\%$ for the overall sample. The margin of error will vary for sub-groups.



Potential Regional Transit Authority Ballot Measures

More than three-in-five voters say they have heard a lot or some about the potential to create an RTA in Yampa Valley.







Nearly three-in-four voters support establishing an RTA in Yampa Valley when we ask about the RTA conceptually (not actual ballot language).


There may be a proposal on the ballot here in the Yampa Valley in November regarding regional transportation. Please read through this language carefully as it is somewhat technical, and then indicate if the election were being held today, whether you would vote Yes in favor or No against this proposal.

The proposal would establish Yampa Valley Transportation Authority through an agreement between Routt County, the cities of Craig and Steamboat Springs, and the Towns of Hayden, Oak Creek and Yampa. The new Authority would improve transportation options for local workers, residents, seniors, and visitors across the Yampa Valley; enhance public safety by maintaining and improving pedestrian access, crosswalks and wildlife crossings; enhance regional bus service between Craig, Hayden, and Steamboat Springs; establish new bus routes to serve Craig, Oak Creek, Yampa, Stagecoach, and communities west of Steamboat Springs along Highway 40; and continue efforts to revive passenger rail for Yampa Valley commuters.





Majorities across party lines support the proposal. Republican voters are more likely than Independents or Democrats to be undecided.




Initial Ballot – Create RTA

Initial Ballot – Create RTA


There is solid support for the creation of the RTA regardless of length of residency.

A majority is supportive of the potential proposal to fund the RTA and two-in-five say they would definitely vote yes.


There could be another proposal regarding the Yampa Valley Transportation Authority. It would seek to increase sales taxes by 1 percent, which is 1 dollar on a 100 dollar sale on every retail transaction – excluding groceries and residential utilities – to fund the operations and transportation improvements of the proposed Regional Transportation Authority.

Support is lower across party lines for the potential funding measure compared to the proposal to create the RTA, particularly among Republicans and Independents.




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Routt County voters are more likely to be supportive of the funding measure than voters in the City of Craig.





Longer-term residents are opposed to the funding proposal, however, that is more than likely a function of age. Older voters tend to be more averse to raising taxes.

Those who have used public transit are more supportive of both proposals than those who have not.



Reducing traffic and providing reliable transportation for commuters are the top reasons voters say they would support the proposal.

"Too many cars and people are commuting anyway." *Male, Age 55-64, GOP*

"Increased transportation opportunities for our bedroom-community workforce are crucial to saving our economy." *Male, Age 18-34, DEM*

"We have got to do something to help businesses get workers and then get workers to Steamboat in a safer way than each driving a vehicle!" *Female, Age 65+, GOP*

Concerns about the already high tax burden are top of mind for voters who say they would vote no.

"With rampant, out-of-control government spending at all levels, the last thing we need is yet another tax increase." *Male, Age 55-64, IND*

"I would rather see the wealthy get taxed. I would rather see property or income tax go up." *Female, Age 35-44, DEM*

> "Because it would be mismanaged by politicians, it would be a bottomless pit for public money." *Male, Age 55-64, GOP*

A plurality of voters say they would vote yes on both proposals.



More say that knowing about the Steamboat Ski Area pledge would make them feel more favorably towards the proposal. Over one-in-three say it wouldn't make a difference in their decision.





If voters approve a funding measure, the Steamboat Ski Area has pledged a minimum of \$1,000,000 per year for 20 years to help fund transportation services through the Regional Transportation Authority. Knowing that, would you be more likely, or less likely to vote yes for the measure, or would it make any difference to you in your vote?


Just over three-in-four voters support the Mountain Rail Project. Hearing about the state's pledge does not significantly impact how voters feel.

Local governments have been advancing the Mountain Rail Project, which would reestablish passenger rail service for commuters between Craig, Hayden, Steamboat Springs and Oak Creek using the existing railroad tracks.

Would you say you support or oppose this potential Mountain Rail Project?

The state of Colorado has pledged to upgrade the tracks, purchase the trains, and pay the fees associated with using the tracks.

Knowing that, would you support or oppose local funds being used to offset the cost of operation and thereby reduce fares for local passengers?

Communicating About a Ballot Proposal

Over half say that each of the funding items we tested are extremely or very important to fund. Items about new routes in areas that aren't served by public transportation are deemed most important.

There are some distinctions by party in how much importance voters place on these items, but the same three items rise to the top regardless of political affiliation.

Statements emphasizing local transportation that is safe and reliable are most compelling to voters as reasons to vote yes.

We need a Valley-wide and year-round approach to help local workers get to and from their jobs, and to provide transportation options for all residents, including students and seniors. Funding transit through sales tax ensures that visitors help pay for a significant portion of these improvements.*

Providing safe and reliable transportation options is important for the residents and businesses in our community. A large portion of local workers in our valley commute into Steamboat Springs. This proposal will help provide better and safer transportation options to help people get to work, while also ensuring that all residents can get where they need to go.[^]

Most fatal car crashes in Yampa Valley occur between Steamboat Springs and Craig on Highway 40. Enhanced transportation options in the valley will improve public safety by reducing the number of cars on the road, decreasing the risk of accidents, and providing safer alternatives for residents and workers traveling between communities.*

This RTA will increase local residents' access to amenities like shopping, community services, health care, schools, the airport and recreation. It helps ensure that everyone—from workers to families to seniors—can get where they need to go across our community.*

The RTA can help improve safety and transportation options for communities that currently must rely on cars to get to schools, shopping, or work. This includes providing safe crossings and bus options for neighborhoods along Highway 40 just west of Steamboat Springs, where it is dangerous for pedestrians, including school children.^

These messages are slightly less compelling, but all except one about climate change still resonate with voters.


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More than one-in-three find the top two messages very convincing. They are not persuaded by the message about tourists. % Total Convincing The price of everything - including housing, groceries and gasoline is going up. % Very 35% Convincing We simply cannot afford to raise taxes right now. This RTA plan is not detailed enough yet to give voters the confidence to 34% approve a tax increase. We need to see more details before increasing our 73% taxes to fund this entity and its projects. The only reason we need this public transportation effort is because of tourists and skiers. Local taxpayers should not be bearing the financial burden of 16% projects that serve visitors.



Support drops modestly after voters learn more, but remains strong with twoin-three in support of the proposal establishing the RTA.



Having heard more I would like you to consider these proposals again and indicate if the election were being held today, whether you would vote Yes in favor or No against each of the proposals.

And there is modest increase in support for the proposal to fund the RTA.



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The Bottom Line

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- When we test the creation of the RTA and the funding of the RTA conceptually (not actual ballot language), both potential proposals receive majority support. Nearly three-in-four say they would vote yes on the creation of the RTA, including voters across major subgroups such as party, region, and length of residence.
- 53 percent of voters say they would vote yes on the proposal to increase sales tax to fund the RTA, and one-in-three say they would vote no. Those in favor of the proposal see the new RTA as a critical service to address traffic and commuting issues in the region. The voters opposed to the proposal say they would vote no because they feel taxes are already too high and the sales tax would disproportionately affect working-class and lower-income families.
- Items that would receive funding from this sales tax proposal are viewed by voters as as extremely or very important to fund. Providing new bus routes in areas without public transportation, improving transportation options for residents, and enhancing public safety rise to the top as most important to fund.
- Statements emphasizing local transportation that is safe and reliable resonate the most. Talking about improving safety on Highway 40 is also compelling.
- After learning more, the final concept tests remain solid, with fully two-in-three voters saying they would vote yes. Support increases slightly on the sales tax proposal, with nearly three-in-five saying they would vote yes.
